## Tom Lewis

We regret to advise you of the death of Pearl's former Deputy Chairman, Tom Lewis, aged 88.

He joined Pearl in 1936 and spent most of his earlier career working in the Ordinary Branch Departments and became Departmental Manager. Tom soon established great respect

and enjoyed a most illustrious career with Pearl. He was a very generous, friendly and approachable gentleman.

In 1967 he was appointed an Agency Controller and then Controller (Staff) two years later. Tom became Personnel Manager in 1971, Deputy General Manager in 1973 and then General Manager (Personnel and Administration).

It was during this latter period that Tom, on behalf of the Company, became heavily involved and subsequently noted for the important development of the signing of a Formal Procedure Agreement, in recognition of the future closer link for Company–Union relationships.

Tom Lewis retired in December 1978 and was appointed Non-Executive Director; he became a Deputy Chairman from February 1980.

Tom and his wife Joyce spent most of their retirement living in Somerset. Members of the Pearl Chief Office Pensioners' Association often had the pleasure of Tom's company at their reunions at the Bonnington Hotel in London.

Then, in 2001, Tom and Joyce joined many other Pearl pensioners in the tours of the old 252 High Holborn, which had then been transformed into a five-star hotel. Shortly after their visit, Tom suffered a stroke since which time his enjoyment in retirement was restricted.

On behalf of all Pearl pensioners, we would like to convey our sincere condolences to his widow Joyce and all the family.

# Peterborough Pensioners' Club – Cromer trip

42 people certainly made the efforts of Terry, our programme secretary, worthwhile in their support for the trip to Cromer in August. The weather was perfect, the Red Arrows superb and the end of the pier show worth every penny. The Red Arrows were sighted bang on time at 12.30 and, in a 25-minute display under clear skies, made not a suggestion of a mistake. In a new manoeuvre, two jets'

smoke trails inscribed a large heart in the sky while a third dived through the heart like an arrow – red, of course. The Seaside Special two-hour show on the pier exceeded expectations. We set off home with a stop at the Ffolkes Arms and on approaching Peterborough, driving towards a typical Fenland sunset, someone turned to their partner and said: "A grand day out, Gromit".

Tony King, Secretary of the Pearl Pensioners' Club (Peterborough) has recently completed a five-week trek in the Himalayas, with the objective of reaching the Base Camp of K2 at 20,000ft and crossing the Gondoro La glacier at 18,000ft.

K2 is the second highest mountain in the world and reaches 5.5 miles into the sky!

The 12-person trek was supported by 30 porters with each trekker also assigned their own porter for the duration of the trip. All the tents, food, cooking gear and specialist ice and snow gear were all carried by the porters along with a 12.5kg bag of personal belongings for each trekker.



"We just had to carry our day packs each day," commented Tony.

The whole trip involved camping out in areas where avalanches and crevasses prevailed and the night temperature dropped to as low as -10C. The luxury of a bath and shave at the end of the trek was most welcome along with a clean set of clothes!

Acclimatisation to altitude formed a critical part of the trip and Tony did suffer at around 17,500ft. "The diet of porridge for breakfast and rice for dinner got a little monotonous, and water from mountain streams had to be purified each day before consumption. The taste of iodine is not one of my favourite flavours," said Tony.

Tony will be making a presentation on his trek to the monthly meeting of the Pearl Pensioners' Club in April 2006.

## Changes in pensions legislation

As you may be aware, the Government has introduced legislation that will have a major effect on pensions and how we fund our retirement. The chief aim of these reforms is to make pensions more flexible and provide more opportunities to save for retirement. There are also a number of other changes, some of which have already been introduced.

A new Pensions Regulator has replaced Opra, and a Pension Protection Fund has been set up to protect most pension benefits for members of company final salary pension schemes where the employer becomes insolvent and the scheme does not have enough funds.

Although it will only affect a few people, there will be a Lifetime Allowance on pension benefits that can be built up. The total value of an individual's pension benefits cannot exceed the Lifetime Allowance without attracting tax on the excess. The Lifetime Allowance will be £1.5 million initially and will increase each year. In addition, there will be an Annual Allowance on how much final salary pensions can increase together with any contributions to money purchase pensions.

Another change, which has already taken effect, is that people can delay taking their State pension for five years after reaching State pension age and instead receive a lump sum payment. If you are interested in this option, you should contact the Department for Work and Pensions.

The new legislation has very little effect on pensions already in payment, but we will update you with any important information that affects pensioners as it becomes available.
