MEMORIES OF 252 HIGH HOLBORN

The continued concerns over Covid-19 and other issues have unfortunately meant that our regular meeting scheduled for this October had to be cancelled. A provisional date of 10 May 2022 has been pencilled in the diary for what I hope will be our first meeting in two years.

In the meantime, we have used the downtime to collect some memories from members who worked at 252 High Holborn. Here are some recollections of early day experiences.



First day

The first day in any job can be terrifying. At High Holborn, this was added to by the imposing front hall where you waited to be taken to your first department. However, as our chairman relates, his introduction to the Pearl was memorable for very specific reasons:

I started work at EW Payne insurance brokers in the City. This was not because I had my heart set on insurance, but it was my first real job offer. However, at school, I had been in the same class as Alan Simmons and when he told me he had started work at Pearl Assurance in Holborn and they had vacancies, free lunches, a sports club and more women than men, my job application was in the post.

My interview was with a Mr Glasgow, a dour man, and he must have thought me strange as I had no suit of my own, so I had borrowed one from my uncle. He was not as tall as me so, with short trousers, a tight waist and short sleeves, I just needed a flat cap to do a Norman Wisdom impression!

For most arrivals, the department you were sent to was a lottery (unless you were a specialist, such as an aspiring Actuary). For reasons that I never fathomed, I was allocated to the Secretary's Department and then to the Property Section. Two likely lads were on the section, one of whom was Jim McGown. I remember the enormous property ledgers, which contained hundreds of properties owned by the Pearl, and part of my job was to record the rents as they were received. Needless to say, this was all done by hand, writing the figures in real ink, not with a ballpoint.

New arrivals were often prescribed 'junior' duties.

I was given the task of collecting and distributing the Directors' post. This gave me the right to wander down the 'forbidden' Directors' corridor and enter their palatial offices.

Early starts

Talking of Actuaries, Tony King remembers starting work for the Pearl on 10 September 1958 at the incredible rate of £250 a year and was an actuarial student straight from school. Initially, he joined the ranks of commuters, travelling by the old slam-door, green, southern region trains to London Bridge and thence by tube to Holborn. He travelled reasonably early because arrival in London before 8am meant paying the cheaper workmen's fare.

Practical jokes

Trish White (formerly Pat Skinner) started in August 1972 and was placed in the Cash Department. She recalls Cash was a great department to start in as most other departments came down for cheques, ledgers etc. so she got to know a lot of people quite quickly as well as what the wider Pearl did. However, the drawback for Trish was that the Cash Department always seemed chilly as it had very high ceilings and the revolving doors were always being opened. There was a mezzanine floor, which housed the adding machine deck, the NCR Room, and the Security Room where cash was counted and the post opened.

Pranks were very much part of Pearl life then and Trish recalls, 'on one occasion, whilst opening the post, someone had put a huge Hallowe'en spider in my pile. Predictably, I screamed loudly, which brought the manager running in (his office being next door) to see what was wrong, who proceeded to tell me off! I hadn't put the spider there and thought I had been hard done by!'

Cutting-edge technology

Hazel Townrow recalls her first day in 1969, starting as one of the audio typists who at that time were dotted about the building close to the departments they worked for. She also remembers when the typists were all moved to form a Typing Centre on the fifth floor. For the technophobes amongst you, Hazel's description of typing equipment during the 70s will raise some eyebrows. 'In the early days, we used electric typewriters, which were very modern then. Later, we upgraded to pink golf ball typewriters, followed by an early computer called a Redactron by IBM, which had a screen and printed backwards and forwards – fantastic at the time!'

Towels and dusters were an integral part of Pearl life. Dusters were only issued to section clerks – unless acquired through other means. Everyone was issued with their own towel. On Fridays, it was the juniors' job to collect them all up and take them down to the basement to be replaced. Woe betide you if you did not have the correct number to trade.

Just a few of our memories recollected during the 'lockdown years'.

News update

Unclaimed pensions

An estimated £400 million of State pension goes unclaimed each year by more than 100,000 over-80-year-olds, who are mistakenly living on no State pension. From the age of 80, everyone is entitled to a £82.45 weekly State pension, regardless of their National Insurance contributions.

The only condition for receiving the money is that pensioners must have lived in England, Scotland or Wales for at least 10 years out of the previous 20. To find out more, call The Pension Service on 0800 731 0469 or go to www.gov.uk/over-80-pension

Find your old pensions before they're given away

A new Bill has been introduced in the House of Lords to extend the Dormant Assets Scheme to include insurance and pensions. It currently redistributes money from dormant bank and building society accounts to social and environmental initiatives across the UK, if the provider has been unable to contact the owner and the assets haven't been touched for 15 years. The proposed extension is a useful reminder to track down any old pensions you may have. The government has a free pension tracing service to help people find their lost pensions at: www.gov.uk/find-pension-contact-details



Suspending the triple lock

The government has announced that the 'triple lock' used to adjust the State pension is being suspended for one year to exclude average earnings growth figures from the calculation. Instead, pensioner incomes in 2022/23 will be uprated by the higher of inflation or 2.5%.

This is because the pandemic has skewed the growth in the average earnings figure as people return to work after furlough, which would have resulted in a State pension increase of around 8%, costing an extra £4-5 billion in State pension expenditure, compared with an increase based on inflation or 2.5%.

The government says this is a one-year response to exceptional circumstances and that it plans to return the earnings element of the triple lock next year.

New rate of dividend tax

From April 2022, the government will increase the rate of tax paid by individuals who receive income from dividends paid through shares by 1.25%. However, shares held in Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) are not subject to the dividend tax.

Power of Attorney reforms

The government is consulting on reforms that would make the process of managing a loved one's affairs through a Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA) quicker to use, easier to access and even more secure from fraud – primarily by shifting many of its paper-based features to digital.

An LPA is a legal document which allows people to appoint someone else (known as an attorney) to make decisions about their welfare, money or property. They are often used by older people to choose someone they know and trust to make decisions for them were they to lose capacity in the future, but they can be made by anyone over the age of 18. While the service will become predominantly digital, alternatives such as paper will remain for those unable to use the internet.
