### **Stirring up memories**

Following the article 'From little acorns, mighty oaks grow' in the last issue, we received two letters from members.

#### **Mr Roy Newcombe**

Bill Jones from Tiverton wrote: "On this day 50 years ago, Mr Roy Newcombe took me on as agent D18/5 at Tiverton. He was a brilliant manager and looked after and stood up for his men."

It is understood that Roy started off as an agent himself at Coombe Martin in 1946 before being promoted to DM working at Tiverton, Barnstaple and then Ilfracombe. It's really nice to know that Bill regularly phones Roy to check on his wellbeing.

#### Mr Alan F Lankshear

Allan G Cook from Halstead, Essex wrote: "I recognised several names but one in particular prompted memories of my early days at Pearl and that is of Mr Alan F Lankshear. He was both my father's and my Divisional Manager in the Y Division. My father joined the company in 1924 aged 15 as a District Office Clerk and went on to complete 50 years' service, retiring in 1974 as a District Agent. He always spoke most highly of Mr Lankshear. They both served in the forces and had several conversations, mostly on England's chances in the cricket test match or of Y Division's chances of beating the A Division in their annual divisional cricket match which were keenly fought matches. Sadly my father passed away in 1984 but he would have been a member when the Trust Deed was established in 1948. My mother, who celebrated her 96th birthday in October, was also employed as a temporary collector and is still drawing her widow's pension for which she is eternally grateful.

Mr Lankshear, who celebrated his 91st birthday earlier this year, not only enjoys cricket but also salmon fishing, regularly fishing his favourite stretch of water in Scotland – the River Dee – which he has visited for over 50 years. I would like to pass on my belated congratulations and good wishes for the future."

Following our visit, we all walked to the very close Royal Oak and spent a very pleasant couple of hours, enjoying a good lunch and the inevitable 'catching up'.

### The Pearl goes back to High Holborn

The Pearl Chief Office Pensioners Association celebrates its 50th Anniversary in 2015 and to mark the occasion PCOPA has booked the Ballroom of the new Rosewood London hotel on Saturday 17 October 2015 for a lunch at the fondly remembered 252 High Holborn.

We will have use of the superb ballroom from noon until 5pm and will enjoy a two-course meal with wine/soft drinks followed by tea/coffee/chocolates. The menu will be available nearer the time and will include a vegetarian option. The only extras will be an optional 'service' charge and a cash bar, which will be open before and after the meal at 1pm.

Members who attended the 2005 lunch at the same venue will be impressed that the new owners have improved the facilities even further. Since its reopening this year, the Rosewood's accolades have included Hotel of the Year, London 2014/2015 - AA Hospitality Awards, Hotel of the Year 2014 - Virtuoso Best of the Best Awards and Best New Hotel in the World 2014 - Telegraph Ultratravel.

The cost per head for PCOPA members will be £45 and for guests it will be £55. We will ask you to make this up to £50 and £60 respectively, so that we can add the voluntary 10% gratuity for the good service we know we can expect from the staff, who all seem very interested in the building's history and anxious to meet 252's former occupants. Any gratuities will go straight to the team who will look after us on the day.

Individual members or members plus one will have priority, but requests for further guests will be allowed if the room capacity permits. Such requests for extra guests will be dealt with on a first come first served basis. New PCOPA membership applications from any ex Pearl Holborn, City, West End or RO staff who are in receipt of a pension from any source will be accepted until a month before the event. This will represent a bargain as lifetime PCOPA membership costs only £10.

We will be asking for a minimum deposit of £20 per person before 15 January. This can be paid by cheque sent to me, Ken McAleer, at 212 Lynmouth Avenue, Morden, Surrey SM4 4RP. Members can pay this or the full amount as soon as they wish. In fact, early payment will help in gauging the final response and whether we need to set any cap on guest numbers.

You can also let me know if you will want the vegetarian option and if there are people with whom you would like to sit, at the tables of 8/10. We will try to meet all such seating requests as far as possible.

All Peterborough based Pearl people are welcome to attend, as are any former Pearl field staff that have a special affection for 252 High Holborn. This may be the last time Pearl folk can gather in large numbers at their old home and we know we will receive a very special welcome from this amazing new hotel.



I have long admired the bonnet bearing the initials RR, which are also my initials.

My ex marketing manager John Houlden arranged a visit for the Tuesday Lunch Club (TLC) to Brooklands Museum, a memorable picture of which appeared in the December 2012 issue of Pension News. The visit crystallised my determination to realise a long held dream to own a Rolls Royce.

I had, over a number of years, acquired Rolls Royce literature including two books pertaining to the Silver Spirit, which began its production 34 years ago in October 1980.

The Spirit retained many of the mechanical features from the previous model, the Silver Shadow II, but lots of changes took place during

the following ten years. The 1987 model year turned out to be a watershed for the range because the changes introduced at that time provided the greatest enhancements to the Silver Spirit line up so far.

My search took me far and wide in pursuit of a 1991 model (essential for switching my existing registration plate of H12 RJR to the roller). Finding the right one at an affordable price and good pedigree within my budget was a priority.

I located a suitable Spirit II and, after initial contact, jumped on a train for Bournemouth. There, upon sight of the Silver Spirit II in Rhapsody Blue and following a thorough visual inspection and test drive, I negotiated a fair price and clinched the deal.

At the wheel of my own Rolls Royce with a journey ahead of me of 140+ miles, I started off at a very slow pace getting used to the feel of the car; the view across the bonnet looking towards the Silver Lady and the road was magical. I stopped at a service station to fill her up and it's the first time it came to more than £100.

On a recent trip to the Midlands I covered 400 miles, averaging 17 miles to the gallon. Around town I get 11 MPG; not bad for 6.75cc with fantastic acceleration when needed (if you don't mind the cost).

### Stay safe in the winter

Each week in the UK, one person dies from an electrical accident and well over a quarter of a million are injured every year. And most household fires - around 20,000 annually - are caused by electricity, with the vast majority arising from electrical appliances. Here, Angela Murphy from Electrical Safety First explains why winter is a time when we need to be even more careful around electrical safety in the home...

Electricity is such a fundamental part of modern life that people often forget its dangers. And with the arrival of winter. bringing shorter days and colder weather (and the Christmas celebrations), our electricity usage invariably increases as does the risk.

This is the time of the year, for example, that many find electric blankets a real boon. But damaged blankets cause more than 5.000 house fires a year, with people aged 65 or more at greatest risk. If your blanket is more than 10 years old, we recommend buying a new one, if possible. Always buy new second-hand blankets may not be safe.

#### **Blanket boycott**

If you use an electric blanket, remember never to use it if:

- 1 It's wet or creased and never switch it on to dry out
- 2 It shows scorch marks or other damage, such as a frayed flex
- 3 You smell burning or hear a buzzing noise when switched on
- 4 You also use a hot water bottle
- Syour hands or feet are wet.

Visits from family and friends tend to multiply around Christmas – along with the cooking! But while the kitchen may be the heart of the home, half of all house fires start there. Fires can be caused by the build-up of fat on electric cookers, air vents being blocked by objects left on top of microwaves, or by dirt, dust and crumbs blocking ventilation and causing products to overheat.

Electrical Safety First has created an app for smart phones, which helps you undertake a basic electrical check of your home. ## Protect yourself online

As Christmas approaches, growing numbers of people opt to do their shopping from the warmth and comfort of their homes, using their computers to place orders for everything from presents to food shopping and travel tickets to visit relatives and friends.


Sadly, as the number of people going online grows, so too does the number (and quality) of scams which target users. Here is a list of ways in which you can protect

vourself online:

- Never give personal information
   (for example name, address, contact
   details or bank details) to a person or
   organisation if you are uncertain of
   who they are.
  - You should always verify their identity before discussing personal matters, particularly if they have initiated contact with you.
- Be aware that even though emails may look genuine, this does not necessarily mean that they are.
  - Scammers can copy logos and typefaces to make their emails look authentic. Remember, banks and government departments won't contact you by email to confirm your details or process a tax refund.
  - Keep your computer's anti-virus software up to date.

- 4. If your bank or credit card company uses secure online services, sign up to them to protect yourself further. This involves registering a password with the bank or credit card company, which you will then be asked for when shopping online.
  - 5. Take care when clicking on links in emails.

    A number of fake websites have been created which look very similar to well-known organisations. There have been cases where people have purchased tickets for travel or for special events, believing that they had bought from a genuine site, when in fact the site was a 'copycat'. The tickets often turn out to be fake, or are priced higher than they would have been through the original site.



### In memory of Gwilym Davies

Gwilym Davies, whose idea it was to form the Pensioners' Club in Peterborough, passed away last July at the age of 93.

I first met Gwilym on 16 August 1948 and the reason I can be so specific is because he was already an established member of Fire & Accident Accounts when I joined the Pearl in that department. Gwilym had served in the Royal Air Force during the war and had come to Chief Office via a spell as a district office clerk in his beloved Wales. However, he was probably best known for his time in RO9, both in Edgware and Peterborough, before moving to GB Accounts where he worked until his retirement.

I can remember quite clearly Gwilym telling me that when he retired he wanted to form a pensioners' club here in Peterborough, an ambition he well and truly achieved. Together with a group of fellow retirees, Gwilym set in motion what was necessary to bring such a club into being. The inaugural meeting to took place on 5 February 1986, when

Gwilym was deservedly elected as the Club's first chairman, a position he held for seven years. When Gwilym relinguished that role he and his wife Lilian were elected as the Club's first life members in recognition of what they had both done for the Club. Gwilym's insistence that the Club should also be open to spouses was instrumental in creating the friendly atmosphere that we all enjoy today.

My abiding memories of Gwilym will be his ability to persuade members to contribute in the running of the Club and his concern for the well-being of others. Right up until recently he was still regularly telephoning fellow members to see how they were. There is much talk of legacies these days but what a legacy Gwilym has left behind, from the humble beginnings in 1986 to the membership standing at 250 today. The Club was well represented by members at the Service of Thanksgiving; testament to the respect and esteem in which Gwilym was held by us all.

Eddie retired in 1989 after 23 years' service as a Pearl agent at the A12 office in Clapton and A10, Palmers Green.








#### **Bernard and Yvonne Scott**


