Tudor barn conversion

Death of Nigel Proddow



Pearl readers will be sad to learn of the death of Nigel Proddow at the age of 87.

He joined the company in 1953 and was a member of the Actuarial department until 1961. Later, he worked in Stock Exchange Securities before his appointment as Assistant Secretary in 1968. He became Deputy Company Secretary in 1973 and on the retirement of Tom Leech, he was made Company Secretary.

From 1979 until 1983 he was General Manager (Personnel and Admin) and, when the post was created, became Joint Chief General Manager.

Nigel came from a well-known Pearl family and his father was a former Deputy Chairman of the Company. He was very active in the Sports Club and once he had retired from participation, was often seen at Club events.

In his General Manager role, alongside James Elmslie, he led the management team in negotiations with the Pearl Chief Office and Field unions. It was in this capacity that I first met Nigel. Although talks sometimes became a little heated, he retained a sense of humour and was always prepared to accept well-reasoned argument. After his retirement, he was a regular attender at Pearl Chief Office Pensioners Association meetings up until his illness in 2016. He always had a cheery smile and a friendly word for all.

Like W. L. Grant and R. E. Beard, his was a name known to many as the signature on policies and renewal notices but he was an important part of Pearl history, who will be sorely missed by all who knew him.

PCOPA AGM 2017





A double diamond that did work wonders

Peter and Joy Harvey are celebrating a double: 60 years of marriage and being with the Pearl Assurance Company.

In 1940, Peter, aged six, was put on the Thames Clyde Express by his father, leaving St Pancras at 10am. He was looked after by one of the dining carriage staff, who promised to see him safely to Dumfries in Scotland, where he was to stay with his granny. His mother, brother and sister would join him some six months later. When their house was destroyed by a landmine in Kensal Green in 1943, his father arrived in December to take the family back to a house in Eastcote, Middlesex.

About this time, or a little earlier, Joy and her family were also bombed out while living in Raynes Park, near Wimbledon and they eventually moved to a house some 200 yards from Peter and his family in Eastcote. After junior school, they both went to Ruislip Manor Secondary Modern and were in the same class, although they didn't know one another at this time. However, they did go to morning pictures in a group of six.

It was only when Peter was working as a booking clerk with London Transport that they went out together. Joy wrote regularly to Peter during his National Service, serving in the Royal Engineers, including 18 months in Villach, Austria – well, someone had to do it! On his return in 1954, they began a relationship and became engaged in August 1955. At this time, Joy was working for Frank, Knight and Rutley in Hanover Square, London and decided it would be better if she found a job locally. After seeing an advertisement in a local shop, she went for an interview at the Pearl District Office in Harrow, where she got the job as District Office Clerk.

In 1956, a vacancy occurred for a District Agent at the Harrow office due to the retirement of Mr Hare. Joy overheard a conversation between Jack Skinner (the manager) and Mr Harold Ellis (the Divisional Manager), which went something like this:





Mr Ellis: Haven't you filled that vacancy on the 2 book yet, Skinner? (pause) What about her out there, has she got a boyfriend?

Mr Skinner: I'll ask her, sir.

Mr Ellis: I'll leave it in your capable hands, let me know in due course.

Joy told Peter about this and the rest is history; from that day, Peter never looked back. One huge asset Peter had as an agent was a young 'whiz kid ADM', Mike Leno who taught him an awful lot.

Joy and Peter married on 30 March 1957 and thanks to a generous council in Chesham who provided a mortgage, they moved into a brand-new bungalow. A couple of years later, they had a daughter and a year or so later, a son. When the children started school, Joy returned to work part time for Pearl, working as and when there was a problem with a DOC vacancy. All in all, she visited around eight different offices over a period of around three years. By this time, they had moved to Oxhey near Watford, where Peter was an ADM. He was then promoted to an OBI, prior to becoming a DM.



Joy and Peter have been associated with Pearl, work and pension, for 60 years now – 60 wonderful years! The real highlight for Peter was his promotion to District Manager at Welwyn Garden City, where he spent 17 wonderful years. The staff there were the very best. They had a fantastic relationship and so many happy and successful years together.

After 26 years in retirement, Peter still meets up with some of them at least once a year for a round of golf and the occasional celebration.
