Fingers crossed for an M & CC Division get-together later this summer.


News update

Decimalisation: 50 years on and still counting?

It is 50 years since the UK said goodbye to its pounds, shillings and pence system and converted to a decimal currency in February 1971. Out went 12 pennies to a shilling and 20 shillings to a pound, and in came exciting new coins: the halfpenny, 1p and 2p.

Today, a different issue about money is emerging, namely, do we need it at all? With the increasing use of the internet for shopping, it is clear that the use of cash is in decline. In 2019, as few as three in 10 purchases used cash – half what it was just 10 years earlier. The Royal Mint has even halted the production of two pence pieces for the next 10 years because of lack of use. The lockdown measures of the pandemic year have no doubt done very little to promote the cause for cash. However, although the use of cash generally is in decline, many of the elderly, vulnerable or those in rural locations still tend to use cash. To support this, the government has committed to protect access to cash and sustain the use of cash by businesses.



Remembering Edgar Evans

Many readers will be saddened to learn of the death of Edgar Evans in December 2020, aged 92.

Edgar's Pearl career spanned 41 years, beginning as an agent in 1950. Several promotions followed during the 1960s, leading to his appointment as the first Company Field Adviser to introduce planned performance to field staff in 1974, working in the N division and then later in the E division South Wales in 1975/76.


Planned performance was designed to record detailed plans for business improvement and measure achievement at regular intervals. It was not an easy concept to introduce, but with Edgar's calm and reasoned approach, it was recognised as a successful strategy and brought about significant results. He was promoted to Divisional Manager of the G Birmingham division in 1976 and won the coveted Blue Riband trophy for performance jointly with the L division in 1978. Edgar became AGM field operations at Holborn in 1980 and then GM field operations in 1988, when he worked closely with AMP officials during the amalgamation until his retirement in 1991.

Edgar was renowned for being immaculately dressed. His shoes were 'cherry blossom' black and his shirts brilliantly 'Daz' white! He would not hesitate to take to task anyone in the sales force who was inappropriately dressed. In the field, he was an excellent motivator and would provide support through difficult times. He had a reputation for being honest, hardworking, professional and always approachable.

In the 1980s, Pearl sponsored athletics throughout the UK, including the half marathon series. I was an entrant in the televised Belfast half marathon in 1985. There was a large gantry at the starting line with a clock counting down to the start. A number of elite runners were taking part, all jostling for position at the start, as it was a qualifier for a major event.

Edgar, representing the sponsor, was invited by the mayor of Belfast to start the race. The starting gun was duly handed over and, with just under a minute to go, Edgar held the gun in readiness but somehow pulled the trigger. The race started in chaos! Some runners started, some waited, but every runner's time had to be suitably adjusted. From that moment, Edgar was dubbed, 'The man with the fastest gun in the West!' With his lovely sense of humour, he was always happy to tell this story.

When Edgar retired in 1991, Pearl was moving to Peterborough, and it was decided to auction a number of artifacts. Catalogues were prepared by the auctioneers, and Edgar had his eye on an unusually shaped wooden chair which had been in his office and would give him good memories of his time at Chief Office. Unfortunately, the bidding took off at a very high figure, and he was rather disappointed that it was well out of his range. No one could believe the price it reached. A conspiracy had been arranged with the auctioneer and at his retirement, Edgar was astounded when the chair was presented to him as a retirement gift. A fitting gesture by the Company for such a popular and genuine gentleman.



Remembering Françoise Nash


